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JEWISH RESPONSES TO THE HOLOCAUST

Kristallnacht Commemoration Features New MCHE Documentary

This year's community-wide commemoration of *Kristallnacht* on Thursday, November 8, at 7:00 p.m. in the Social Hall at the Jewish Community Campus, 5801 West 115th Street, Overland Park, Kansas, will showcase the documentary film *Jewish Responses*, newly produced as the sixth film in MCHE's Witnesses to the Holocaust series.

Kristallnacht—known as the “Night of Broken Glass”—was an anti-Jewish pogrom devised by Joseph Goebbels, Hitler’s minister for public enlightenment and propaganda, and carried out by the SS and other national police agencies 74 years ago on November 9 and 10, 1938. Jewish businesses were vandalized and homes ransacked and burned. At least 100 Jews

were murdered and 30,000 Jewish men were imprisoned in concentration camps. *Kristallnacht* ended the illusion that normal Jewish life in Germany and Austria was still possible.

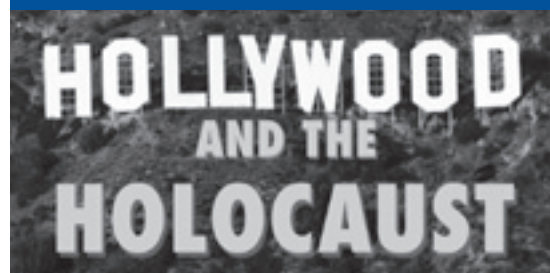
The one-hour film features excerpts from MCHE’s videotaped survivor testimonies along with archival and personal photos to describe the broad spectrum of Jewish responses to the Holocaust. These responses—individual and collective, armed and unarmed, social, political and cultural—demonstrate European Jewry’s perseverance and proactivity in the face of overwhelming forces.

Production of *Jewish Responses* was supervised by Dr. Fran Sternberg, MCHE’s “in house” historian and director of university programs and adult education, and Jessica Rockhold, director of school programs and teacher education, who also provided voice-over narration.

Generous funding for the film was provided by the Jewish Community Foundation of Greater Kansas City, with special consideration from Outpost Worldwide.

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EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

The Future of Holocaust Education: Balancing Popular Culture with Accurate Historical Memory

At two conferences I attended this summer—one in Detroit, sponsored by the Association of Holocaust Organizations, and the other at Yad Vashem in Jerusalem—a total of nearly 500 center and museum directors, historians, scholars, educators and survivors representing over 50 countries explored the future of Holocaust education and discussed the increasing challenge of balancing popular culture with accurate historical memory. Topics included antisemitism, the role of recorded survivor testimony, emotional vs. historical engagement of audiences, connections to contemporary issues, the impact of social media, denial, misappropriation and trivialization of the Holocaust.

As professionals contemplate and debate the relationship of Holocaust studies and the broader framework of contemporary atrocities, these factors are being carefully considered. Remembrance and relevance are essential to these conversations as events become more distant and as we no longer have eyewitnesses to convey their personal experiences firsthand and to provide the compelling connection that can be achieved only in their presence.

In attempting to compensate for that void, there is a temptation to link or compare the Holocaust to a wide range of seemingly or minimally related events and issues, oftentimes sacrificing its particular elements for the sake of universalizing its meaning.

When the Holocaust is presented as the universal symbol of man's inhumanity, we must take care to avoid "over-relevance," which often results from that approach and may blur the unique essence of each experience. However, we cannot and should not lose sight of what has happened in the ensuing years.

The conference theme at Yad Vashem, "Telling the Story: Teaching the Core," may serve as the best guide for Holocaust educators, though it was suggested by program organizers on the final day of the conference that perhaps the two phrases should be reversed. First, teach the core; then, by all means, tell the stories.

Over and over, conference participants heard that the primary role of centers like MCHE is to convey the facts, particularly to teachers so they "get it right." This has always been basic to our mission, and we will continue to provide educational resources that create context for survivor testimonies as well as learning opportunities and sound pedagogical approaches for educators.

MCHE is also committed to engaging and educating our community through programs that resonate with general audiences while respecting the integrity of the history. During the coming year—our 20th anniversary year—we are offering an exceptional array of programs, projects and resources that both teach the core and tell the story. Whether you approach the Holocaust from an emotional or historical perspective, we trust that as you read this newsletter you will discover many opportunities to learn more about this history and find meaning in its representation, whether through academia or the arts.

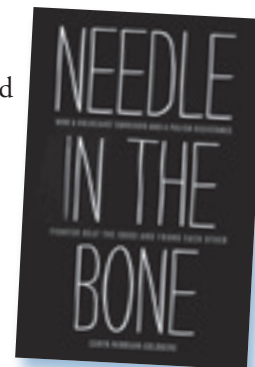

Needle in the Bone

Join author Caryn Mirriam-Goldberg, poet laureate of Kansas, as she discusses her book, *Needle in the Bone*, at an event co-sponsored by MCHE and the Kansas City Public Library. The book, to be released this November, weaves together the stories of Holocaust survivor Lou Frydman and Polish resistance fighter Jarek Piekalkewicz. Taken in the Warsaw ghetto uprising, Frydman survived six concentration camps and three death marches. By war's end, everyone else in his extended family had been killed except his brother. Piekalkewicz started his own underground army at age sixteen. In addition, one of his uncles was the main leader and another the head treasurer for the Polish Resistance before the Nazis discovered, tortured and murdered them. Frydman, who passed away earlier this year, and Piekalkewicz met in 1975 in Lawrence, Kansas, and became best friends.

Hollywood and the Holocaust

American filmmakers' varied depictions of Adolf Hitler, the Nazis and the genocide of European Jewry have always involved a coming together of art, commerce, politics and history. In turn, these representations have exerted a profound influence on public perception and opinion about these events.

To mark its 20th anniversary year, MCHE will offer a six-part program series featuring narrative films produced in the United States and nominated for at least one Academy Award. The monthly series, to be held at the Jewish Community Campus, will begin in January with *Imaginary Witness: Hollywood and the Holocaust*, which provides context and background for five commercial movies, dating from 1942 through 1989.

Collectively, the films illustrate how depiction of the Holocaust in American cinema has changed over five decades as the country's own relationship with this history has evolved. All films in the series will be shown in the White Theatre, except in February, when the film will be shown in the Campus Social Hall.

Each film will be preceded by an introduction at 7:00 p.m. and followed by a question-and-answer session, facilitated by Dr. Fran Sternberg and members of the Holocaust Education Academic Roundtable (HEART), MCHE's consortium of university educators. The discussions will provide insights on how to view these films for both their artistic and historical value.

Featured Films

JANUARY 15 • *Imaginary Witness: Hollywood and the Holocaust* (2007)

This documentary film, directed by Daniel Anker and narrated by Gene Hackman, examines the treatment of the Holocaust in Hollywood films over a period of 60 years and the impact of those films on public perception and thinking, and vice versa. (92 minutes)

FEBRUARY 12 • *To Be or Not to Be* (1942)

Directed by Ernst Lubitsch and featuring Carole Lombard, Jack Benny, and Robert Stack, this American comedy depicts how a troupe of actors in German-occupied Warsaw used their abilities at disguise and acting to fool the occupying troops. In 1983, Mel Brooks remade the film, featuring himself and Anne Bancroft in the Benny and Lombard roles. (99 minutes)

MARCH 12 • *Gentleman's Agreement* (1947)

Based on Laura Z. Hobson's 1947 novel of the same name, *Gentleman's Agreement* features Gregory Peck as a journalist who goes undercover as a Jew to expose antisemitism and personally discovers the true depths of bigotry and hatred. Directed by Elia Kazan, it also starred Celeste Holm, John Garfield and Dorothy McGuire. (118 minutes)

APRIL 23 • *The Pawnbroker* (1964)

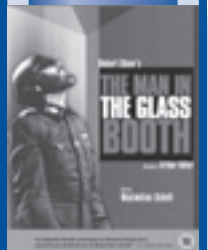
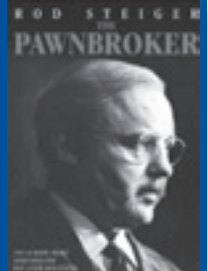
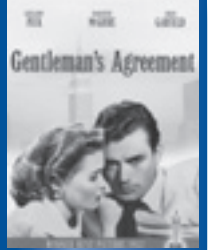
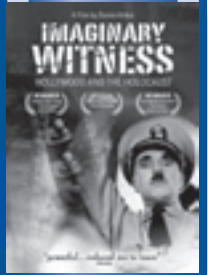
Rod Steiger stars as a German-Jewish concentration camp survivor living in the Bronx who has lost all faith in his fellow man and only realizes the tragedy of his actions when it is too late. Based on the novel by Edward Lewis Wallant and directed by Sidney Lumet, this is the first American film to deal with the Holocaust from the point of view of a survivor. It also features Geraldine Fitzgerald, Brock Peters and Jaime Sanchez. (116 minutes)

MAY 21 • *The Man in the Glass Booth* (1975)

Arthur Goldman (Maximilian Schell) is a rich Jewish industrialist, living in luxury in a Manhattan high-rise. He banters with his assistant Charlie (Lawrence Pressman), often shocking him with his outrageous and irreverent views about Jewish life. Then, one day, Israeli secret agents burst in and arrest Goldman for being a Nazi war criminal. Whisked to Israel for trial, Goldman forces his accusers to face not only his own presumed guilt but their own. (117 minutes)

JUNE 11 • *Enemies: A Love Story* (1989)

In 1949 New York, a Polish Jew (Ron Silver), who was hidden during the war and who now works as a ghostwriter for a Jewish rabbi (Alan King), finds himself involved with three women: his current wife, a Polish non-Jew who hid him during the war; another survivor (Lena Olin), who is married; and his first wife from Poland (Anjelica Huston), who was thought to have been killed in the Holocaust along with their two children but who suddenly reappears. Based on the novel by Isaac Bashevis Singer, the film focuses on the survivors, who question religion and a God who could let the Holocaust occur. (119 minutes)

CONTESTANTS WILL ADDRESS THE SEARCH FOR SAFE HAVENS

This summer, as classroom teachers prepared to implement the new Common Core educational standards—a state-led effort to define the knowledge and skills students should have within their K-12 education careers and which heavily emphasize reading and writing skills—MCHE convened a focus group of educators to assess the White Rose Student Essay Contest and how to align it with the Common Core standards.

After 17 successful years of the Essay Contest, we learned that most of its structure and intent should remain unchanged. However, to craft the contest as a way for educators to meet the new standards, this year's contest will shift to a document-based format.

Contestants will explore the theme *Flight from the Reich: The Search for Safe Havens* through the study of pre-selected documents, images, testimonies and art forms while expanding their understanding through their own historical research. The postmark deadline is April 4, 2013.

Eighth through 12th grade students in the 18-county metro area are eligible to enter the contest, which this year will expand to recognize first, second and third place winners in both the 8th-9th and 10th-12th grade divisions. 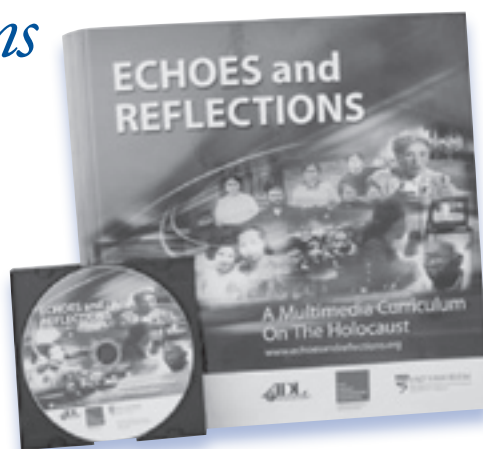
